Last year, the Letter Answering Department handled more than TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND LETTERS! With its efficient staff and excellent equipment, it gave quick and personal aid to many thousands of people.

But it wasn't always like this. The Letter Answering Department started in 1954 with one small desk, one file cabinet, and one typewriter in the dark, dingy, and dusky southeastern corner of Mayfair catacombs.

The only natural light came from one

submerged window. Shrubbery obscured half the light. Artificial light came from a 120-watt bulb dangling by a wire from the ceiling.

News Chief Reports on European Tour



"Sind Sie Deutscher?" asked the young bellhop in Belgrade's Hotel Slavia after overhearing me speak German with the room clerk. "Nein," I answered, "ich bin Amerikaner." His eyes lit up. "Ach ja, Amerikaner! GUT! GUT!"

It made me feel pretty good that Americans (or perhaps it's their money) are still well-liked it Titoland. This was just one of the many little incidents that added spark to my recently-completed $7\frac{1}{2}$ week tour of the Continent.

It is really a wonderful experience to be plunked down in the midst of a foreign culture — and then to work your way around it. It can be quite challen-



Mr. Norman Smith—head of radio studio.


pines, Elizabethville and other powerful stations.

Spanish Work Grows--More Is Needed

Latin Americans Fed on Spiritual Starvation Diet Desperately Need Gospel. A Few are Being Reached.

In the midst of Catholic dominated Mexico, a small group of twenty in Monterrey has turned to keep God's Sabbath. Although originally affiliated with the Sardis Church, they have broken away from that organization. To them—THIS WORK is the very Work of God.

But, unfortunately, they have very little contract with God's Church—a few pieces of literature and the broadcast, if weather and broadcasting conditions are right.

It is very sobering to realize that ALL of Latin America is on a spiritual starvation diet.

A woman in Costa Rica writes: "I have recently been unable to hear the broadcast on any of the three stations I usually hear. I need these broadcasts. Please . . . pray that that God might let me have this spiritual food."

She also says: "How happy I would be to just . . hear ONE sermon by a true minister of God, on ANYTHING. I've never heard one, and it may be years before I do."

Dr. Benjamin Rea's fifteen-minute broadcast can be heard once a week in small areas throughout Latin America. This Spanish program El Mundo de Manana brings in sixty to ninety letters a month. Although the letter count is low, the money count is rather high. Percentage wise it averages from one to two hundred dollars a month. These figures do not, however, include the Latin American mail received in England.

Nevertheless, there is encouraging news for the future of the Spanish Work. Mr. Charles Dorothy has heard that new broadcasting DOORS may be OPENED in northern Mexico. If so, this would be a wonderful blessing for the Spanish Work. It would mean that additional millions would be able to at least hear the TRUTH of El Mundo de Manana.



ging. Language barriers often present hilarious situations. I'll never forget the time Mr. Frank Schnee and I ordered breakfast in a motel along the autostrada just outside Florence, Italy. We wanted some boiled eggs — but none of the help understood English and we didn't have our pocket dictionaries with us. What to do? The enterprising Herr Schnee cackled like a hen and the language barrier crumbled.

While my mind is on the subject, I would like to make a "plug" for our language departments. Most of you students have no idea how helpful it is to know another tongue when travelling overseas. "Oh I'll never get to Europe," you say. Don't be too sure! Such a trip

advertise American products — most of them now made in Europe. A popular brand of automotive tires in Germany for example is "Firestone-Phoenix."

A look at the shelves in food stores also reveals the inroads the U.S. has made even on the European dinner table. Canned fruit labels often read "Packed in California, U.S.A." (This vast outlet for American agricultural goods is now threatened by new Common Market levies.)

Not everything that America sends abroad is of comparable quality. Flipping the car radio dial one night I came across, of all people, Chubby Checker singing "The Twist" in German. Yes, that's right — Chubby Checker, in German, and atrocious German at that! And he wasn't the only offender. Record mills here in the States are literally

grinding out boatloads of discs "sung" in German and French by pimple-picking, acne-scratching American rock-nrollers and dumping them on the European market. What a black eye on America!




The cold steel revolver was pushed gainst my ribs. An uncertain finger was wrapped around the trigger. Scores of "what if" questions raced through my mind. Was I ready to die now?

This 1956 epsiode happened in Chicago—noted for its underworld mobsters and gang-land slayings.

Dr. Zimmerman heads LAD staff.



(Continued from Page 1) school year, he acquired an assistant. From then until the fall of 1957 two men staffed the department.

However, a large influx of mail during the 1957-58 year demanded a larger staff. Five men were added and the staff has grown ever since.

Today, with Dr. Clint Zimmerman in charge, the Letter Answering Department employs fifteen men and twenty women. Eleven of the men and five of the women work full time.

The staff handles slightly more than TWO THOUSAND LETTERS PER MONTH.
