In the North Pacific Union Gleaner for March 3, 1958 Elder Bunch is quoted as asserting that not ony is Questions on Doctrine "sound in doctrinal exegesis" but he further informs the reader that "it will be the means of bringing many to a knowledge of the truth for these days."
