NEW CHURCH IN BALTIMORE

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Lest You Forget!

What lessons have you forgotten? Lessons acquired by trials, persecutions, sickness or death; expensive lessons - but necessary for spiritual growth.

One individual with whom I was acquainted started to take God's blessings for granted. He was not truly thankful for the daily necessities God provided - food, shelter, clothing, air we breathe, freedom to worship Him and good health. Suddenly he was stricken with the

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inability to breathe easily. Forced effort had to be applied for continued breathing. A request to be anointed was made. After the anointing the statement, "Oh how thankful I am to breathe again" was related. A real display of appreciation to God followed.

Ensuing conversation was centered on the lesson of being thankful for the daily blessings God bestows. Other desires and wants disappeared. The lesson was inscribed deeply within the afflicted person. But, has he retained the lesson or has he slipped back to a lethargic attitude of unthankfulness? Has he forgotten the sacrifice Christ paid so that we can continue to have an abundant life and life eternal in the future? We must all ask ourselves during this season, "have we forgotten the lessons we have so dearly learned in the past year?"

The Days of Unleavened Bread picture coming out of sin. Have we truly come out of sin this past year or have we merely forgotten the teachings we have received from God? One way to be sure we haven't forgotten, is to daily recall in our prayers those events in our Christian lives which have produced character growth. Go over past trials, afflictions, persecutions, etc.--the sum total of important lessons. David did this frequently in the Psalms. If you make this part of your prayer life, the process of coming out of sin will be easier. Be diligent - lest you forget!

MORE ON STRAUSS

The most potentially explosive political feud in West Germany today is between two Bavarians: Ludwig Erhard, 67, who is the Chancellor, and Franz-Josef Strauss, 49, who would like to be. Strauss, forced out as West Germany's Defense Minister two years ago, firmly controls the Bavarian branch of Erhard's Christian Democratic party and its 50 Bundestag members. Erhard desperately needs their support, but, in return, Strauss wants to be made Foreign Minister.

Nowhere in Germany but in back-slapping, egalitarian Bavaria could a butcher's son like Strauss have risen so far, so fast. Bavarians, aware that many regard Strauss as the most dangerous man in Germany, say that he mustn't be taken as a typical Bavarian. But his own constituents call him the "Bavarian Bull." DETROIT - The Detroit Saturday Evening Spokesman Club toured the printing plant of the "Flint Journal" in Flint, Michigan on Saturday evening, February 20.

Then a short but fun-packed variety show followed with Mr. John Odie as Master of Ceremonies.

One of the most helpful parts of the whole social came next. It was as though the years of little confidence in our dancing ability evaporated under Mr. Jackson's able dance instruction. He had everyone out on the dance floor as he taught the waltz step in such a way that even the wallflowers wanted to dance!

Our social came to a close.

Many milestones of real Christian growth passed on this day and we left with the memory of this exciting day very fresh in our minds.


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TORONTO - On February 21st, 18 people, including five married couples were baptized in the beautiful Leaside Swimming Pool.


