WEEKLY SUMMARY

The returns to the latest Co-Worker Letter have given our percentage of increase for mail income a big boost. For the first time in about five weeks mail income is over 30% with prospects of finishing the week with about a 33% increase if the mail continues to hold steady. However, the percent of increase for the total income will be somewhat lower. The letter increase through Thursday was 75.9%, however, this figure will probably drop into the sixties by Friday. A minor factor in the high letter increase is returns to the Subscription Renewal Letter, but this is not all of the story since the White Mail and the Co-Worker Mail have been quite heavy.

LONDON: About 75% of the Semi-annual Letter responses are requesting TOMORROW'S WORLD. Many readers, in response to the TOMORROW'S WORLD article, "The Man Who Couldn't Afford to Tithe," are asking questions.

VANCOUVER: Our total income for 1969 increased 40% over 1968. The letter increase was up 110% and the subscription list shot up 90% to well over 110,000.

La Pura Verdad mailing list is up 180% over 1968 to SPANISH: 73.000 plus. The Correspondence Course trails at 166% increase with nearly 5,500 students. Our money figure is up 57%. We have received nearly 90,000 letters this year, of which 60,000 were from the ad campaign in Selecciones. We have a list of over 200 persons in Latin America and Spain who are waiting to be visited.

THE TEEN SCENE

"I'm 19 and the article for teen-agers helped me greatly. It helped me to realize more fully the wrong attitudes we young people are tempted to have and to really comprehend the wonderfully unique opportunity that God has offered us. I think what young people need most from their elders is guidance, someone who understands their problems, instruction in true knowledge, and personal concern for them as an individual. All of these things I and thousands of other young people have received from God through His ministers. Words seem so inadequate, but I do desire to say thank you." In fact, I have been really ill over this and don't think I will ever be able to lead a normal life again. It is as if my very heart has been torn from me and I feel a complete failure as a mother. I really worked at being a good mother and was quite proud to have raised such a sweet, intelligent, beautiful girl, when suddenly it blew up in my face."

"Is there really a college where people can go to learn instead of waste their time, energy, and lives in fanatical protesting and witch hun for happiness? I'm only 20 years old and had reluctantly given up the idea of college—a little sad and downright disgusted because of the situation in the schools here in Detroit. I was told that I was using 'excuses' to get out of going to college by leaning on the student disorders. My mother, never really in favor of girls going to college, begged me not to enroll, and I have to admit it didn't take much coaxing to deter my plans away from the mess in our universities. Then I got your Semi-annual Letter—I opened it and glanced hastily over it, put it down, and went out to start dinner. The next thing I knew my mother had your epistle in her hand, begging me to write to you about Ambassador College. Shocked? I'll say! My mother, who had seizures every time I mentioned the local school system, was saying, 'Go to Pasadena. I don't mind! If you were going to Ambassador College, I'd feel you were safe.' And that's why I'm writing. I got on the bandwagon, read your letter, and know that yours is the only college for me! Please send me information on it, and hurry! At last I'm going to college!" WEEKLY SUMMARY

Response to the latest Co-Worker Letter is giving us a fairly good mail this week. The money increase jumped above 30% by the middle of this week, but apparently will be considerably below 30% when the week ends. White Mail has been fairly good, but the number of people being added to the mailing list is quite low compared to last year. Items of literature requested most heavily this week are "The Wonderful World Tomorrow," "The United States and British Commonwealth in Prophecy" and the article, "Dinosaurs Before Adam?"

LONDON: Money this week has picked up. We now have an increase of 13% over January last year. The overall mail count is also higher this week and we have now received nearly 25,000 letters for the month so far from Britain alone. The June Semi-annual response in India is leveling off at a figure of 63%, to give a total of almost 18,000. Total mail for January in Holland so far is almost 1,700 letters.

AUCKLAND: In Auckland the summer holidays through January tend to hold back both money and mail. Mail increase is only 4%, but the money

increase is very good at 28%.

VANCOUVER: Mail for the last week of January has dropped slightly in Vancouver, but the income is following the same pattern as last January and will end the month at just under 40%. The letter count will be over 50%.

SYDNEY: Sydney reports a 28% increase in money for the week with the monthly figure standing at 25% in money and 43% in mail.

WEEKLY SUMMARY

This has been a very good week in regard to letters. As of Thursday afternoon it appears we will have over 57,000 letters for the week, which will give us well over a 50% increase for the month. White Mail has been very good as well and shows a substantial increase for the month to date. Last March was a very heavy month in income, so we will need an excellent month this year to show a decent increase in money. The most heavily requested literature for the week has been "The Wonderful World Tomorrow" and "The U. S. and British Commonwealth in Prophecy."

LONDON: Both the mail and money count for February were very good. However, because the last week of February in 1969 was very exceptional in both money and letters, our increases were only 15% and 5.3% respectively. The article on Dinosaurs, in the January PLAIN TRUTH, drew by far the largest number of comments.

VANCOUVER: Even though February was a fine month last year, we were able to maintain a 25% increase in money and 84% in letters to date for 1970. So far, the response to the last subscription renewal letter is 36%.

SYDNEY: Both money and letters are down from last year with a -12.9% in money and a -8.5% in letters. Returns to the recent Co-Worker Letter helped somewhat, but not enough to bring our percentages out of the red. A 24-hour strike by postal workers has disrupted our mail delivery.

AUCKLAND: February closed with a 39.2% increase in money--our highest month of total income. Semi-annual returns began to come in from Southeast Asia, which contributed to our 57.4% increase in letters for the month. The article on Dinosaurs brought many favorable comments.

March ended with a 9.1% increase in money from mail receipts only. The letter increase, which was inflated by renewal returns, came to 44.5% over last March. Even though the White Mail showed a very small increase, we had a new monthly record with 73,047 white letters. The previous record was set March, 1969. April is starting out with a bang. The first two days show over 250% increase in money. This will level off, however, for Friday, but still will show more than a 100% increase for the first three days of April. For the first two days of response from the latest Member Letter we have received \$46,000 in Special offerings. We shope to see the response to this letter starts to really come in next week.

VANCOUVER: Mail was very heavy in March. Last year we had a 155% increase in letters, and now there is a 69% increase over last year. The income for the month showed only a 9% increase over last year. Returns to the subscription renewal letter for March were 43.5%. Income from the March renewal, however, has been poor.

AUCKLAND: March ended with no significant increase in money over last year--it was about even with last March. Semi-annual returns from Asia were heavy the last week of the month. The majority requested a subscription to TOMORROW'S WORLD.

April has been the second highest month in the history of the Work, both in letters and money. The letter count for the month was 335,041. Our highest month was December, 1969 with 355,753 letters. A large number of these letters were responses to the general renewal letter sent out in March. Our increase for the month was 131% in letters and 41.8% in money from mail receipts only. Several booklets are in heavy demand in the White Mail this week, but the leading one is "The Wonderful World Tomorrow."

VANCOUVER: The year-to-date letter count shows a 70% increase, and a 27% increase in money.

ENGLAND: For the year so far, we have an increase in money of 21.7%. The best ad response in three months has come in from our April Reader's Digest ad on "Seven Laws of Success."

JOHANNESBURG: Our overall mail shows an increase of 38%. The money, however, shows a 2% decrease—not counting the Holy Day offerings.

SYDNEY: Year-to-date figures continue to improve and are now a 34.9% increase in mail and 30.1% in money.

AUCKLAND: We show a 26% increase in mail and 28% increase in money as our year-to-date figures.

Response to the latest Co-Worker Letter is holding the income up quite well for the week. We are facing a pretty good month in June since last year we were receiving returns from the Semi-annual Letter. It appears we will close the week with about a 30% increase in money, but it is doubtful if we can hold our own during the coming week. The letter count for the week will be somewhat over 30,000, but the same week last year we had nearly 82,000. White Mail shows a little over 9,000 for the week and the most requested booklets have been "The Wonderful World Tomorrow," "The Plain Truth About Child Rearing" and "Our Polluted Planet."

ENGLAND: The income looks more encouraging, with a 26% increase for the year to date. The mail count is running well with a 28% increase for the month of May.

VANCOUVER: Mail has taken a serious drop the last week of May. The indication is people hesitate to write because of the threatening mail strike. The year-to-date increase in money stands at 33%.

SYDNEY: The month of May ended with increases of 9.8% in money and 19.5% in letters. The series on evolution is in good demand as well as the pollution booklet.

JOHANNESBURG: The year-to-date money shows an increase of 8.5%, while the mail falls behind by 4.2%. This is due to our Semi-annual influx early in 1969 which we didn't have this year.

AUCKLAND: The month of May has been very encouraging in regard to money, with an increase of 81%. Mail, however, due to the Asian transfer to Sydney, shows a 60% decrease.

"OH, WAS THAT YOU SCREAMING?" AND OTHER VIOLENT COMMENTS

"The article 'Oh, Was That You Screaming?' describes the callous attitude of the public right here as well as the bigger cities. Right here in South Dakota, where West River pioneers maintained a code of offering a free hand of aid to anyone in need of help, we now see a common occurrence of noninterfering while brutes torture the weak, crippled and helpless. WEEKLY SUMMARY

June ended with a weak 4.4% increase in income for mail receipts only compared to June 1969. The overall income brought the increase up to 21.9%. White Mail was very low showing a 21.8% decrease for the month. We are receiving a fairly heavy response to the Semi-annual Letter sent to regulars. Our letter count for the week stands at 84,000 Thursday afternoon, and should surpass 100,000 letters after Friday's mail is counted.

ENGLAND: A good response to the Co-Worker Letter has helped maintain our money increase at 25% for the year to date. The mail count, however, is down.

VANCOUVER: A good volume of Semi-annual Letters came in this week despite the postal strike. The letter count stands at 45% for the year so far, and the income shows a 30% increase.

JOHANNESBURG: The yearly increase in money has risen to 28%. There is no realistic mail comparison we can make, since last year at this time we were receiving heavy Semi-annual responses.

AUCKLAND: This has been a very slack mail week, still our year-to-date mail increase holds at 40%. Income shows a 67% increase for the year.

FRENCH: At the end of May the mailing list for La PURE VERITE stood at 72,484--a 44% increase. There are 4,864 students on the Correspondence Course list, and our Co-Workers number 1,365.

CRISIS IN EDUCATION

"I experienced the greatest shock of my 31 years in public school work last week when I was notified by the newly elected superintendent of schools of Joplin that he was not recommending me for a contract for next year. I have served as dean of girls at one of the three senior high schools in Joplin since coming to the school system 17 years ago. My request for a reason for this sudden dismissal was not granted, but it apparently hinges on my negative vote to strike for higher wages, which was considered to be a non-professional act on my part. During the strike I reported to my building for duty along with several retiring teachers. Even though many parents and students came to my defense, the transaction was legal in every aspect under the present Missouri school law. The termination of my contract in this manner also
