
Lively Outdoor Party Hosted for Children



Seoul, Korea: April 20.

Greetings brethren! I'm writing this personal column from my hotel in the capital of the Republic of Korea. I've been away from Manila now for 10 days on the yearly tour of Northeast Asia to visit with prospective members and members in this part of the world. So far two people have been baptized --a lady in Japan, Mrs. Catherine Okano; and the first native Korean (on Korean soil. There are, I believe, a couple of Koreans in the U.S. who are members) in this era of God's Church, Hyungbok Song. The first week of the tour was crowded with problems but everything worked out well in the end

DISAPPOINTING START

Mr. P. Mirto, who is with me now, was not able to join me the first week, due to passport problems and lack of time (due to a practical close-down of the country for "Holy Week"). So I left Manila for Okinawa alone. On arriving at the Okinawa hotel I discovered a staff strike was in progress. However, there was still a skeleton staff manning the hotel so I was all right. The man I was to meet there had left a letter informing me regrettably that he had to leave for the U.S. that very morning (he is in the U.S. forces) and was not granted an extension. It was a disappointment to miss him. Another man that I had written to never turned up at all. The Okinawa visit was therefore fruitless. On checking about m y flight next day to Tokyo I

was informed of a possible air strike. As you may have read in the newspaper Japan was going through a general transportation strike at the very time I was there.

I had to wait until next day to find out the situation. I was very | ti, Rizal D-708. happy to discover that all Nippon airways I was booked on was not on strike. Only Japan Airlines was, so I was able to fly to Tokyo.

CROWDED TRAIN RIDE

I was met at Tokyo airport by Mike Dale, a graduate of Ambassador College who has been studying in Japan for his master's degree for the past two years. As he is leaving to return to the U.S. in late April he had sold his car so we were not able to use it to visit the people we needed to. This meant using the public transport system, but at that time it was closed because of the strike. I spent Friday at the hotel. By Sabbath morning the strike was settled and some trains were back on again. This was the last day of Unleavened Bread so we planned to visit the home of Mr. Tanner (about one hour from central Tokyo) for the day. But first we went to the home of one of the people who had requested a visit. This was quite an experience because we had to use the Tokyo metro rail system. You may have seen films of the crowds being jammed into the Tokyo trains. Well, this time I experi enced it first hand! It was a bad enough experience for me being tall-I really pitied women and children who have to go through that crush time and again. Our visit turned out to be fruitless when we discovered the young girl had not requested our visit at all, but that it had been done

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by her father living in the U.S. The girl could not even read English and wondered why she was receiving the Plain Truth magazine. We travelled on to Mr. Tanner and spent the late afternoon and evening with them enjoying a very fine meal and hospitality.

TRIP'S FIRST BAPTISM

On Sunday morning, April 14 we spent another hour travelling by train (this time there was no crush) to the north of Tokyo to see Mrs. Okano. She is originally from

Switzerland and is married to a Japanese. They have 3 children. She speaks good English and also Japanese. After a couple of hours counseling we were happy to be able to baptize her into God's Church. She had a Japanese friend who was interested in God's way of life, but who could not read or understand English. Right now there is no way she can fully come to know God's way because we have no literature in the Japanese language and the Japanese Bible is a very poor and misleading translation. Because of this I cannot foresee God calling many, if any, Japanese people to the Church in this age.

On Monday I flew up to the northern part of Japan to a town called Hachinohe where we have one member living nearby, Mrs. Porter. It was very cold up there. Mrs. Porter came to the hotel. Tuesday morning and we had a good talk together before I left to return to Tokyo. Another man in the same area whom we were to see, didn't show up.

MORE PROBLEMS

The problems started again on Tuesday. In the Tokyo hotel I checked with Japan airlines about my flight to Osaka where I was to meet up with Mr. Mirto and fly on to Korea. I was informed that Japan Airlines was striking again Wednesday -- this time it was the cabin crew! And the other domestic airlines were also goin on strike. How could I get to Osaka and Korea? If we missed our schedule it would ruin the second part of the trip. I had to meet with Mr. Mirto and try any way possible to get a flight to Korea.

remembered Then I the famous bullet train service between Tokyo and Osaka. This was the an-I booked a seat on swer. this and caught the first train (6:00 a.m.) Wednesday morning. This was an enjoyable experience. There is nothing like this train in the U.S. or Europe. It is very smooth ride, with fully reclining seats as in airliners, and travels at 200 kpm. We covered the distance between Tokyo and Osaka in just 3 hours 13 minutes, with two stops on the way (Nagoya and Kyoto). Again, this was an amazing thing. Because if the train companies had not settled the two-day strike the previous week, they had planned on striking again on this Wednesday! If this had occurred I would have been stranded in Tokyo with no way of reaching Osaka in time). Having contacted Mr. Mirto Tuesday night through Cathay Pacific Airlines, I was able to find where he was staying in Osaka, and went there on leaving the bullet train. It was quite an occasion meeting up at last after all the problems (I will let Mr. Mirto explain his travel to Osaka in a separate article).

ANOTHER MIRACLE

The next miracle was 'that Japan Airlines flight to Pusan, in South Korea was not cancelled, but was going ahead as scheduled! Yet that day all domestic airline were cancelled due to the strike! We had tried to get a Korean airlines flight but it was fully booked. We could certainly see God's hand helping us keep to our schedule to do His Work.

In Pusan we counselled with a prospective college

student and then spent five hours with Mr. Song. It was a joyful occasion to baptize him that day. Next day we flew up to Seoul, and that brings me up to date at this point. Right now we are waiting for the arrival of Mr. Weakley, our sole member in Seoul(!), an American living here. I will continue this Personal later on.


Hong Kong: April 24

Well, here we are in Hong Kong on the final day This afternoon we fly home to Manila arriving at 5:00 p.m. We had a good visit with Mr. Weakley in Seoul. spending the Sabbath with him and also Sunday morning. He presented us with a fine Chinese painting for the Office and 1 8 sending by freight a ceramic rooster which we can use in our new office premises. The weather was very cold in Korea although sunny and we were glad to leave Sunday after noon for Taiwan.

It was raining when we arrived in Taipel around 8:00 p.m. After checking in the hotel we were able to visit with Dr. Lee for a short while before he caught his train home to begin work Monday morning. Dr. Lee doesn't live in Taipei, but in the interior of Taiwan. Next morning we had a short visit with a co-worker there and then caught the afternoon flight to Hong Kong.

IS IT REALLY VINEGAR?

(From the Daily Express, March 8, 1974)

That sour stuff with which the typical Filipino dips "tuyo" (dried fish) some mornings, deserves some thought. Is the sour mixture really safe vinegar or is it mere diluted synthetic acetic acid?

The Department of Health prohibits the sale of diluted synthetic acetic acid as vinegar because of its potential hazard to health.

This, among o the r things, was pointed out in an open forum following an evaluation seminar of a project of vinegar making. The quick process of vinegar manufacture is one of the researches funded by the Special Science Fund of the National Science Development Board at the National Institute of Science and Technology at Taft, Manila.

It was learned from audience discussions that some 65 percent of vinegar peddled by pushcarts, sarisari stores and public markets sold in Greater Manila are mere diluted glacial acetic a c i d. Opinions were voiced that this sour concoction is

Sometime ago Mr. Adair mentioned that if we will not have enough increase we will have no other recourse than to dip into our reserves. Many bretheren, especially the new ones, wonder why we can't stand on our own feet that is, be a self-supporting Work - in spite of the fact that we have reserves.

To enlighten you concerning this matter, allow me to explain the meaning of the word "reserve." How is it obtained and how is it put to use?

In a profit corporation when the financial gain exceeds the operational expenses, the difference is the net profit. It is a net loss when the situation is vice versa. When there's a net profit the corporation concerned could either distribute it to the stockholders in the form of dividends, or retain it. Retain net profit is termed "Retain Earnings." This is the same as the reserve.

The Worldwide Church of God, the Ambassador College and all its agencies around the world are non-profit corporations, aside from being religious in nature. Hence, the reserves can't be distributed to the stockholders who in essence are the members and the co-workers.

Every year the expenditure side is always bigger than the income side. How come then that we still have reserves in spite of this? Well, this is simple mathematics.

The answer is the financial assistance we are receiving from headquarters. Without this continuous support the Manila office could have folded up a long time ago. Or if

PENTECOST MOVED TO MAY 26

The observance of Pentecost this year has been moved from June 2 to May 26.

This year has been unusual in the sense that the Passover also fell during a weekly Sabbath. This occurrence happens only once in about a hundred years.

Therefore, the counting of 50 days starts "beginning on the morrow after the Sabbath" (Lev. 23: 15--as the Heb. "mi-moh rat ha-shabbat" should have been more clearly translate ed. See Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong's letter of Feb. 11, 1974), April 7 which is actually also the First Day of Unleavened Bread. We cannot start counting on the morrow after the Last Day because that would be far out already. (See Joshua 5:11 in connection with Lev. 23:15). The 50th day after that therefore falls on May 26!

He adds further, "You need not worry for I pay on time and I don't eat too much!"

I hope the income, not only locally but including all the offices around the world particularly headquarters, stays high so that we will not have to dip into our individual reserves.

I SHALL NEVER GIVE AN INCH

I am writing to let you know the experience I went through when my mother died of a sudden heart attack last March 5, 1973.

My father decided to have the body embalmed for a duration of 12 days. As he is one father who is a firm and diehard believer in the pagan native religion in our community and also claims his religion excels all kinds of other religions, he commanded us, his children, to strictly observe and follow his religion.

Being the eldest in the family and being a member of the Church of God I tried to explain that I could not do according to his will because I have already been baptized into the Church of God. I have decided to stick to my religion forever, so they will forgive me for not complying with their will.

I said this even with tears and in a humble and kneeling position. But to my surprise my father was angered so much that he began to talk at the top of his voice. He began saying that there is only one God and that he himself as a human father represents Him just the same so that we as his children must obey whatever he commands us. He also reminded me that one of the commandments of God is love and respect your parents and even love your enemies. That I should then show my love especially to my dead mother by performing those pagan rites. He also warned me that if I do not now repent of my new religion (the Church of God) and won't follow him, God will surely punish me. As a proof he claimed that all his lifetime he has

seen many examples of people who have disobeyed their parents, and disobeyed their parents, and disobeyed the native pagan religion. They were all cursed and punished by God. So it was going to be no different with me. If I did not obey him then I must not expect any inheritance from him -- that I should go wherever I wanted to go and that I must remember he means it.

Somehow I managed to pacify his anger by asking for the second time to forgive me all that I had said. He did and talked of other business matters.

Spiritism!

As we were to continue watching over the dead body day and night for 12 days, and with the presence of more or less 60 people (composed mostly of our relatives and a few visitors from different places), something unexpected happened.

As it is a genuine belief among these people that man is a living soul with a spirit that goes to heaven after death, my mother supposedly now in spirit form, wanted to talk to us through another individual (a woman relative of ours). They believed she was possessed by the spirit of my dead mother. She began to talk or act exactly as mother did when she was alive. Because all of them believed and honored this spirit as my mother, my crying sisters and relatiwes began to embrace her and said that they were thankful she came to talk to them.

As I chilled in the corner as though I saw a horrifying demon (nevertheless I was calm and strong in mind but hesitant to move) the possess-

ed woman came to me and embraced and cried over me. She began to advise me that I should show my love and respect to her as a mother, if I ever really loved her, by obeying and following their religion. She asked me why I refused to do the pagan rites. I answered, "Because I fear God more than anything else and that if I disobey God I will surely end up in the lake of fire."

Demons At Work

Then all at once she answered, pointing to herself, that they are the ones responsible for throwing me into the lake of fire.

At this moment all the people began to fear. Some of them came crying and patting my back begging me to please say yes and follow them. My sister pleaded that I would please make our mother's journey to heaven smooth by obeying and doing according to their religion. Some of them even tried to say according to the Bible There is only one God after all, that I should say amen to them. Some said that since we cannot see God our physical parents are our God and so forth.

Threatened

When I told them my answer was final and that they would please forgive me, this made my father all the more angry. With a loud voice and in great disappointment he accused me of being wise, a kind, yet a disobedient, disrespectful, ungrateful, hardheaded, shameful daughter. That I dishonored him entirely before the eyes of these people. That I was too much of a burden, a problem and a shame to the family. That if it were easy to end my life he would do it. DILEMMA OF A RICE-PRODUCING PROVINCE

One aspect for which the province of Laguna is popular, aside from tourist spots, is rice-growing.



It was the town of Los Baños, Laguna that gave birth to the C-4 hybrid varieties of rice. The "C" stands for College. Adjacent to it is the International Rice Research Institute (commonly called IRRI) that gave birth to the IR hybrid varieties, the so called "miracle" rice varieties. It would be safe to say that some 65% of RP ricelands are planted to these varieties.

Soon seedlings were exported to other Asian countries where they became popular too.

Problem Starts

But alas, in less than five years rice plant diseases unheard of before and known only to some scientists, started affecting these hybrid varieties. So many strangesounding terms came popping up to describe the different kinds of unusual rice plant diseases.

As fast as these diseases are coming up so are the researchers on chemicals. But it would be a waste of space to name these different chemicals. Most of them which are seemingly helpful to rice plants are dangerous to other leafy vegetables, fruit trees, animals and humans as well. Cases of poisoning are becoming more frequent.

In spite of all these, plus the new techniques of rice planting, rice plant

diseases rage on becoming worse as time goes on. Newly planted palay that appears so vigorous, robust and promising soon withers and succumbs to these diseases. In towns of Cabuyao, Sta. Rosa and Biñan 80% of the ricefields are affected. Statistics for the whole province of Laguna are not available, but the problem is really weighty.

Government Action

The governor of the province has called for a meeting of the people involved in rice production: the banks, agriculture sector, tenants and land owners.

The problem is that rice plants are dying before they can be harvested some two or three weeks after planting. Others die even during their earing and near harvest stage. Some planters have reached as far as 4 plantings consecutively without harvest. Too many expenses have been incurred.

The meeting resulted in the governor, Mr. F. San Luis, ordering rice planting to be suspended in the province of Laguna until June. The consensus is that these diseases thrive only where there are rice plants. If there are no rice plants there will be no disease. Hopefully after this season rice production for the province will be done successfully, according to the governor.

gery due to the complications that arose from the first operation. My stomach bulged due to intestinal obstructions. He carried out a colostomy on my intestines. It was quite an agonizing process for me and those around me for it was the only operation where general anaesthesia cannot be administered anymore to my semiconscious body lest I might not awaken again. Dr. Figueroa could not help shaking his head when he saw my condition. But thanks be to the Eternal for once more He did not allow me to have my last breath. "You have just passed through a needle's eye," commented Dr. Cruz' wife after the successful operation.

SAVED AGAIN

The third operation was done successfully also after two months of living miserably due to the compostomy (I cannot forget how I cried to God then). This was performed for three hours by three surgeons headed by Dr. Jose Caedo, the director of GSIS Hospital. Thereafter my full recovery began.

My life thus being a constant saved was source of reflections for me. I believed God wanted me to live a longer life for a reason I could not discern before. 
