

Campus Pitfalls - BEWARE!

Going to college or to a university may be the most faith-shaking experience that you have ever had. If you have not been saved by the power of the Lord Jesus Christ and gained real faith, there is little hope for you getting through college without being drained of all that is vital to Christian living—faith, driving devotion, and love. Taste and know that the Lord is real. College is important. Go to college; but be prepared by putting on Christ before you go.

To know just what you will face in college I would like to expose you to many of the faith-diluting sources and tools of professors. Basically, the college approach to mastering life itself is through the mind. The mind becomes, to the collegiate, the all-enlightening guide which will never fail.

I believe at this point it would be well to mention the two basic levels of human existence. One is the flesh; the other is the spirit. Paul in Romans mentions that our desire is foremostly upon one or the other. What is important to understand here is that both the spirit and the human, fleshly existence are subdivided. In the realm of the flesh is the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life—the lower division or level; and the intellect or mind—the higher division or level. On the college campus the carnal lusts of fornication, covetousness, greed and others are abundant. But a zealous profes-

sor or student of intellectualism believes that by following the mind or the intellect, you can be elevated from the carnal lusts (though I doubt they would explain this using the term "carnal lusts.")

The intellect, or mind, then, becomes the method of finding the goal of intellectualism truth. On many college buildings you may find the scriptural quote, "Ye shall know the truth. and the truth shall make you free." To the intellectual or scholar, truth is the goal of life and the method of obtaining truth is by the mind. Christians are to seek after truth also, which is knowing and following Christ and God. The way to know and find God is first of all through Christ; and second by the Word (the Bible). To know God is more rewarding than just satisfaction, which is the scholar's reward of finding truth. It will yield eternal life!

The most basic tool of the intellectual is a term with which you are probably not acquainted—empiricism. This idea states that basically we can find truth through the sense organs; that is, we can determine truth by seeing, smelling, tasting, feeling, and hearing it. A logical development of this is that since we mostly experience (see, smell, taste, and hear) material things, truth must be bound up in the material things. Material things are those things produced either by nature, such as trees; or by man, such as cars, houses and the like. It is

not difficult to see why Karl Marx, using the materialistic approach to truth, believed that if man shared and had in abundance material things, man could live in a state of peace and bliss with one another.

Christ made the secondary importance of material things when He said, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things (material things of life) shall be added unto you.... Man shall not live by bread alone but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."

We are all well acquainted with what evolution is essentially. It is a product of an intellectual tool closely related to empiricism—the scientific method. The scientific method, defined in its crudest form, is a method of finding truth by progressing from an idea of believed truth (hypothesis) to an idea of proved truth (law) by experimenting and observing. It is used widely in science and in the social sciences (geography, sociology, political science, anthropology, and economics).

Let us go back to evolution which was a product of the scientific method. There are many things in evolution which are really troubling. Carbon-dating seems to reinforce the idea that the earth is millions of years old. The levels of life from the simple, one-cell organism to man are closely related, indicating perhaps that man developed from the simplest unit of life.

Maybe you can think of other troubling ideas which are a result of evolution.

There is an expression which says to fight fire with fire. To do that here would seem most logical. I could give you explanations which might be viewed as scientific which would counter the statements above that trouble us as Bible believers. I am not going to explain my views. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts neither are your ways my ways. . . . For as the heavens are higher than the earth so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your

a child accepts as true what his parents tell him.

We know truth and have faith only when we have JESUS and follow the Bible. We can discuss and argue against evolution all we want to with someone else, but that other individual will only be able to accept the creation of Genesis as real when Christ comes in to put faith in his heart. Believe it or not, however, the scientist, despite the scientific method, must use faith to believe that what science seems to prove true actually did occur-such as the evolution of the earth and man.

Skepticism, with agnosticism, stares at a student relentlessly in certain courses . . .

thoughts.... I thank thee, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the WISE and PRUDENT, and hast revealed them unto babes.... All scripture is given by the inspiration of God...." (Isaiah 55:8 and 9, Matthew 1:25, and 2 Timothy 3:16).

The point is that the Bible is revealed truth that is logical and scientific but cannot be analyzed or tested in the laboratory because its truths are not found in physical things. Intellectual ability is not the basis for discovering Bible truth. Rather, the basis is in being children to the degree that we can trust what God says just as quickly and unquestioningly as

Another tool of the intellect is "a priori" logic. Crudely, this means a method of finding truth by using rules of reason which have nothing to do with experience. You probably won't come in contact with this unless you take history, philosophy, or religion. Philosophers in the ancient and medieval periods were interested in whether there was a God, what His nature was, whether man had a soul, and this type of thing. There are things which our sense organs cannot explain, because we do not normally come into contact with God, nor our soul, through our sense organs. We normally do not see, hear, feel, taste, or smell God. By using rules of

logic you can supposedly answer these questions.

The problem here is that philosophers come up with different answers than the Bible by their techniques. It is interesting to note an exception, an English philosopher of logic, who was baptized with the Holy Spirit in the past few years—Dr. Prince. He stated something to the effect that the Bible follows precisely the rules of logic. Of course! God hates confusion for He is the author of order, logic, and the laws of science.

Now I must, to make this article complete, talk about an attitude and a belief which accompanies zealous intellects. Using the tools of empiricism, the scientific method, and a priori logic (which are useful and beneficial tools when you are not dealing with religion) demands skepticism; and often produces in the religious realm, agnosticism. Skepticism is a questioning, critical attitude, and agnosticism is the belief of one who questions whether or not God really exists. It is good to question and to be critical. Ideas, facts, statistics, and other things we see or hear should be thought over carefully for accuracy and application. We should also question religious ideas and doctrines we read of, or hear, from sources other than the Bible. going straight to the Bible to check whether or not they are true. But we cannot and must not, for our spiritual health's sake, question the Bible. We

must accept the Bible as inspired. Otherwise, we can believe and do what we want for we then have absolutely no standard, no guide, no answers to the problems of life and the salvation of man.

Skepticism, with agnosticism. stares at a student, relentlessly in certain courses. Avoid taking religion in any college other than Midwest Bible College, or at a college where you know the instructors are spiritual. The despiritualized, agnostic instructors of religion will pump you full of questions and doubts as a determined goal of their teaching. They may ridicule God and curse in the classroom so much that you really will have to pray much to avoid being dragged down into the pits of emptiness and despair. Usually a student has a choice of six hours of religion or philosophy. Choose the latter, by all means.

Humanities and history may be rough in ancient civilizations. Don't fall for arguments that Israel got its laws from a source other than God. One other civilization had laws like Israel, so instructors tend to explain that Israel's religious and secular laws were borrowed. Fortunately, the flood can now through archeology be proved to have at least existed in the Near East so the flood cannot be ridiculed.

It is important that you take literature; but grit your teeth and pray much that the small degree of trash and smut you will be required to read will be Use your college education to witness to those who, though having a college education, lack Christ.

counteracted by the Lord. Psychology is important also-but watch out. Psychology has arguments to explain the transformation Christ makes at salvation and baptism. If you have been saved, you know it is a powerful, miraculous transformation. If you want to read of miraculous transformations of salvation, read David Wilkinson's The Cross and the Switchblade. To be changed from a dope addict to a Christian, from using dope to not using dope, is miraculous. To be saved as a dope addict, and not experience

the withdrawal that agonizes an addict for some thirty days, is miraculous.

Go to college if you have the ability and the desire. There is a danger to Christians, but also a great reward. The reward far outweighs the danger if we have put on Christ. Have a Christian friend or parents to talk and pray with you when you need help. Above all, draw nigh to God and He will draw nigh to you. Use your college education to witness to those who, though having a college education, lack Christ.

HOW TO MISS THE STING AND GET THE HONEY

An experience I shall never forget was an opportunity I had in the Orient to watch natives take honey from a bee hive without being stung. They are almost unprotected by their dress, yet they are rarely stung.

Why? Well, the explanation they give is this:

"We are passive, deliberate in our movement. We make no effort to fight and protect ourselves, nor do we attempt to drive the swarm away."

Thus, when a bee settles on one of them, it attempts to sting him no more than it would a plank of wood.

That wasn't the way it happened to me when I used to help my grandfather as a boy. Nervous, restless, and combative, I soon had a swarm of bees after me—all the way to the house and through the screen door! And I got stung!

Our troubles in life swarm around us like bees. Let us fret and fume, and we shall feel the sting and miss the honey; let us live in quiet and in confidence, and we shall taste the sweetness and escape the harm!

Tell Me, Please

Youth Questions answered by Ray L. Straub



OUESTION:

The church (ministers) seem to have definite ideas on what is right and wrong. Why don't they preach on it more? Is it because there is so little agreement amongst the ministers? Why are you so reluctant to take a definite stand in this column?

ANSWER:

Most questions I receive are concerned with the question of what is permissible and which activities should be shunned. Yours is the most "loaded."

It is my opinion that the ministers preach on these matters quite a lot. Some dwell on them more than others. but a large segment of any minister's audience will learn rather rapidly over a short period of time where their pastor stands.

Each minister has his own approach on how to deal with these issues. In my opinion, more can be gained through dialogue with young people; that is, in a type of meeting where direct questions can be asked and answered. In this way, specific reasons can be given for specific attitudes.

Any lack of preaching on this sub-

ject would not be due to disagreement amongst ministers. In fact, disagreement tends to cause more expression, not less.

The nature of standards is such that there will always be some disagreement concerning them. Lack of uniform thinking was always manifest during the Apostle Paul's ministry. Standards change from time to time and from place to place. It would be a terribly static church that did not have some varying viewpoints concerning its standards. The amount of disagreement cannot be considered nearly vast enough to be serious. Few churches experience more harmony amongst the ministers than ours, particularly in view of the freedom they have in the Church to express themselves on these matters.

It is because standards relate to the communities in which we live that I do not give specific recommenda-

tions in this column. What is permissible in one area can easily be offensive in another. An inquirer needs to discuss specific taboos with their pastor or minister nearest them. If you move into our community it will not be long before you have some idea where I stand.

OUESTION:

What is a good argument against evolution?

ANSWER:

- 1. It is not logical to believe that the cosmos came out of chaos. Any masterpiece in planning and organization results from intelligence. It takes a precise amount of measuring. beating, and baking to make a good cake. It takes precise chords to compose good music, and it takes a correct alignment of words to write a good thesis or book. Understanding this, how can one believe that anything as beautifully organized as this universe came about through accident?
- 2. There is no known explanation for beginnings. The mind can only go so far until its incapabilities leave it dangling. Experiencing this, it leaves us with only one believable explanation-way back God existed "in the beginning." I admit, readily, that this is no proof that God exists. However, believing He existed in the beginning, it is logical that He created the earth and set the universe in motion.
- 3. There is neither agreement nor proof supporting the evolution of the species. No valid proof exists that there has ever been a change from one species to another. Changes have come about only within the species.
 - 4. The best argument against evolu-

tion is to get to know the Creator personally.

QUESTION:

How old should persons be before they begin kissing?

The value of any item is determined somewhat by its supply. Editorial

People scattered over the entire nation waited with anxious concern because a 19-year-old bride was being held at gunpoint by a former, jealous suitor. Why the concern—by people who were not even remotely acquainted with her? —Because a human heart reaches out to another who is miserable, afraid, and alone; particularly when one's very life is in danger.

All about us every day are people who are not only miserable and feeling quite alone with today's problems, but their eternal life is in danger.

Somehow, though, it is hard for us to parallel the urgency of this situation with that mentioned above. Are we concerned? We tell ourselves we are; yet it is so easy to put off this concern and action, it seems, where someone's salvation and eternal life is concerned. There always seems to be a tomorrow—a more opportune time—a better opening to introduce the subject of Christ and what He can mean in a life.

Why is this such a difficult task? Why is it that we are always wanting to do better in witnessing—and yet we put it off? The likelihood that our attempts at witnessing will be unappreciated, possibly even resented, and very possibly rejected, tends to discourage us.

Perhaps it will help to parallel this with another modern-day warning that is being rejected by thousands—the warning against smoking. In spite of the avalanche of undeniable evidence concerning the dangers of smoking, which is hurled at the public in general, we find that multitudes of people continue to smoke. Others—thinking, willful, conscientious people, heed the warning, and give up smoking with unthwarted determination.

Perhaps this can help us to understand the human race. There will always be those who will accept truth, and those who will reject and ignore the plain facts, regardless how overwhelming is the evidence. We can't let this dampen our enthusiasm or endeavor to promote truth, and to bring the joy of salvation to those who will accept it.

What can you and I do to better spread the good news of the gospel in a personal way? Each of us can only answer this individually; but for each of us, it is important to recognize that before we can have either the ability or the genuine desire to witness for Christ, we must have Him truly in our own hearts. What's more, we must fellowship daily with Him, both in prayer and in reading His Word.

You are concerned, you say? You are only as concerned as your actions show.

Brother Lloyd Clark has spent much effort, on his own time and initiative, we understand, to help rehabilitate boys in prison. He has a genuine concern and interest in this endeavor. We find very interesting these excerpts which he has shared with us on several occasions, giving us better insight into the thoughts and feelings of those who sometimes may automatically be dubbed "All Bad."

CONFESS

(Brief excerpts from and comments based on three letters to the writer from a twenty-five-year-old convict.)

by L. C. Clark

"I have done many things in my life for which I am very much ashamed. I have stolen from my parents; I have hurt people I loved; I lowered myself to the lowest among whom I live today. I can never forget my past. I must learn to live with the memory of it."

This is the voice of a young man, twenty-five years old, talking to you from a small cell within the walls of a State Penitentiary. At 18 he had his youth, his friends, and a home like the young people who read this. He had finished his high school and had some personal plans for the future; but inside, something happened. He can tell you about it.

"You see, I had little love as a child. My home was one to be endured rather than enjoyed. I was an adopted boy. I sensed that my father thought he got a bad deal. I believe he resented the adoption. Mother was proud of me when she could dress me up and show me off. When we were alone she assumed a different composure. Thus, before I grew out of my nickers, I was a mis-

fit. My home was responsible for so many complexes...."

Should I not pause and let you re-evaluate what you have read? It sounds logical and true, does it not? More, it seems to make us think about ourselves. But hear a little more of another letter.

"I feel inhibitions result from social influences...from 'selfdeceptions.' Many people are emotionally victimized by precepts that are ingrained during childhood. Many influences are heaped upon us before we are capable of understanding them. Nevertheless, it is necessary that we be 'held' responsible, for the sake of law and order."

Can you see how he thinks? He knows his past...he is not covering nor does he rebel because of his punishment. He wants to tell you more.

"At 16 I was IT. I was good looking (and he still is), I had some money, resentments that I did not understand nor could control; I found no one who did understand and it seemed that no one cared. So I showed off. At 17, I was owner of the world, and of all who joined me. At 18, after graduation from high school, I took to the road that led nowhere. Now I am waiting for the day when the sun will shine again. When that day comes—and soon, I hope, I must try my best to contribute something decent to this life. By doing something to help someone else, maybe I can relieve the guilt for all the wrong done. A transition has come about in me in the past year I cannot explain. I will answer why my books were not balanced. They never balanced because I was unbalanced."

It takes only casual thinking to understand this confession. Prison has brought this arrogant young man to his knees. From rebellion, he now longs to serve; clearing the dust of confusion through the long hours of waiting. Secluded in the silence of the forgotten world of people, he sees clearly the way he has come; he wants to rule off this ledger and start a new one.

I am sure Tom's confession is not yet finished. I know that his dreams for the future are just beginning to take shape. He is not quite as hard as most prisoners about the church and the Christian way, but he is far from acceptance of Christ as the One Who can remove the guilt and balance the books and set up a new capital account.

(We need others to enter this forgotten mission field to help redeem lonely, heartsick men from out of the night.)

It is my privilege to furnish you with this information of the founding of the F.Y.C. in the Church of God, London, England.

Two years ago, as a result of a revival in which many young people surrendered their lives to the Lord, the F.Y.C. was organized with eight members. Electing my wife, Eileen, as their advisor, they immediately formulated plans for the advancement of the group. Within weeks it became apparent that the Lord was leading in the lives of these youngsters. Their activities within the Church brought great joy and rejoicing to all of us. However, bringing joy and rejoicing to the brethren within the Church wasn't all they had in mind.

With their brand new experience in Christ, their primary goal was to reach out to the young people of the community. They wanted to share their experience with their friends and tell

them that real living and lasting security begins with Jesus Christ. It may be that you would like to say "praise the Lord" at this point because the group has now increased to 16. Presently there is an F.Y.C. meeting conducted every Thursday evening in which many of the young people of the community participate.

The F.Y.C. in London also conducts a visitation program among the elderly people of the locality, especially those suffering from loneliness, and from deficiency. They see this as an opportunity to give a certain degree of comfort to the elderly. Their limited knowledge in welfare work is their disadvantage; however, they are learning as they go.

The F.Y.C. operates outside London as there are three other groups located in different parts of the country that look to the London Church for some support. The London FYCers travel at certain times and render programs in the afternoon to these groups.

I am really pleased to say that the F.Y.C. has furnished the London

Church with a beautiful electric organ and other musical instruments.

These youngsters have indeed made a fine start, but there is still so much to learn. However, Elder Dale Lawson, President of the F.Y.C. in the U. S. A., is now corresponding with the group and I am convinced he will be able to offer new ideas. (However, I reserve the right to introduce hav rides and weiner roasts there in London.)

I feel it is safe to say that with the F.Y.C. operating in the Church of God in England, the future is very bright.


Oklahoma Youth Camp



The Acts of the Apostles

in Paraphrase



(Continued)

Ananias To Caesarea 24:1

Five days later Ananias, the high priest and the elders went down to Caesarea. They took with them, one Tertullus, an orator; who was to prosecute Paul before the governor.

Tertullus 24:2

When Tertullus was called, he began his case against Paul, by saying, "We acknowledge, sir, that by your efforts we enjoy great quietness; and that through your governing, many very worthwhile things are done for our nation. We always accept these things everywhere, most noble Felix, with all thankfulness.

"I must begin to speak to you of our difficulties, or I may cause you to become tired of listening. I ask, please, listen to us with your kindness.

"We have found this man Paul, to be a plague to us. He encourages rebellion among all the Jews of the world. He is a ringleader in the sect of the Nazarenes. He began to profane the temple; so we took him and would have given him justice according to our law; but Lysias, the chief captain, came on us, and with a great use of force, took him from us.

"Lysias ordered Paul's accusers to come to you. In that way, you can examine him yourself, and know from first-hand knowledge the things of which we accuse him."

The other Jews present agreed and verified what had been said.

PAUL SPOKE 24:10

When the governor beckoned for Paul to speak, he said, "I know that you have been the ruler over this nation for many years. So I speak to you in behalf of myself with more confidence.

"So that you may understand more clearly, I must say that it was twelve days ago that I went to Jerusalem to worship. The Jews did not find me arguing with any man in the temple. I was not stirring the people into any rebellion in the synagogue or in the city.

"These people cannot prove the things of which they accuse me. But, I confess to you: the Way these people call, heresy, is the way I worship the God of my fathers. I believe all the things written in the law and in the prophets. I have a hope in God; the same hope which they, these people, have; that there will be a resurrection of the dead, of the righteous and of the unrighteous.

"This is the way I conduct my life: to always live with a conscience free from offences toward God and toward men,

"Now, after an absence of many years, I came to give alms and offerings to my nation. Then some particular Jews from Asia, found me in the temple. I had been purified and I was not with a group or in some conflict. Those Asian Jews ought to have been here and objected to me, if they knew of some offense I committed. Or let these who are here say if they saw me commit offense when I was before them in the council.

"I have done nothing, except perhaps in that I said to the council as I was before them, 'I am called in question before you today because of the matter of the resurrection of the dead."

FELIX 24:22

When Felix heard these two arguments, he had a better understanding of the Christian way. So he delayed any action in favor of the Jews, and said, "When Lysias, the chief captain, comes down, I will look into your problem to the fullest degree."

Felix ordered a captain to guard Paul and let him have freedom of movement. The captain was not to forbid any of Paul's friends to come to him to help him to be more comfortable.

After a certain amount of days, Felix came with his wife, Drusilla, who was a Jewess. He sent for Paul and listened to him as he talked about faith in Christ.

Paul reasoned to them on matters of righteousness, temperance, and of the judgment to come.

Felix became very nervous and said, "Go your way for now; when I have a more convenient time, I will call for you."

Felix hoped that a bribe would be given to him by Paul to gain his freedom. So Felix sent for Paul more often and talked with him.

After two years Porcius Festus succeeded Felix. Felix wanted to please the Jews, so he left Paul in custody.

CHAPTER 25

Festus, To Jerusalem 25:1

Three days after Festus came into the province, he went from Caesarea to Jerusalem.

The high priest and the leading Jews spoke to Festus, against Paul. They asked a favor of Festus. They wanted him to act against Paul and have him sent back to Jerusalem (so some could wait in ambush to kill him).

Festus, however, said that Paul should be kept at Caesarea and that he, Festus, would leave shortly to return there. Festus said, "Let those among

you who are able, go with me and accuse this man, We will see if he is actually wicked."

Festus stayed there in Jerusalem more than ten days. Then he returned to Caesarea. The next day as he was sitting on the judgment seat, he ordered Paul to be presented.

When Paul arrived, the Jews that had come from Jerusalem stood all around. They made many bitter complaints against Paul, but the complaints could not be proven.

Paul defended himself, and said, "I have not acted against the law of the Jews, or against the temple or even against Caesar. I have not acted against anything."

To Jerusalem 25:9

Festus, however, was trying to please the Jews. He replied to Paul with this question, "Will you go back to Jerusalem and go on trial there before me?"

To Caesar 25:10

Paul answered, "I stand at Caesar's judgment seat where I ought to be tried. I have done nothing to the Jews and you know that very well.

"If I have been an offender, or have done anything punishable by death, I would not refuse to die. If no one accused me of a crime, no man has the right to surrender me to the Jews. I appeal to Caesar."

After Festus had conferred with his council, he said, "You have appealed to Caesar? Then you will go to Caesar."

AGRIPPA AND BERNICE IN CAESAREA 25:13

After a certain amount of days, Agrippa and Bernice came to Caesarea in honor of Festus. When Agrippa and Bernice had been in Caesarea for many days, Festus explained Paul's cause to the king: "There is a certain man detained here who was left by Felix. When I went to Jerusalem, the chief priests and the elders of the Jews spoke to me about him. They want to have a judgment against him.

"I said, 'It is not the practice of the Romans to deliver any man to a punishment of death unless the accused has had the opportunity to meet his accusers face to face, and to have the privilege to answer for himself concerning the crime he is accused of committing."

"So when the Jews came here, I sat on the judgment seat without delay the next day, and ordered the prisoner to be presented.

"The accusers stood to speak against the prisoner; but they did not present any accusations such as I had expected. It was some matter against the prisoner in regard to their own Jewish superstitions; and about one Jesus, which was dead, but whom Paul insisted to be alive.

"Because I had my doubts about the accusations, I asked him if he would go to Jerusalem and be tried there on these matters.

"But when Paul appealed to be detained for a hearing by Augustus, I ordered him to be detained until I am able to send him to Caesar."

Agrippa said to Festus, "I would like to hear the man myself."

Festus replied, "You will hear him tomorrow." (Continued next month)

I'll read two or three times as many chapters tomorrow to make up for my lack today? Suppose you are not a Christian, but you are beginning to read your Bible each day and you are becoming aware of its Truths. Perhaps you think this is an extreme case—a one in a million chance, but what assures you YOU will not be that "one in a million"?

My point is this, young people, please do not put off until tomorrow or from day to day, but do it NOW—today. Your Bible reading is important whether you are a Christian or one just beginning to glimpse the promises of God and taste of His Word. The more one learns of Him the more one wants to know. Do not procrastinate but do it today: and may God bless you as you read.

We are thankful to God for the beginning in September of another school year here at M.B.C. where ministers are being trained to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and where Christian young people come to better equip themselves to be good witnesses for their Master. Many times already, we have felt the great presence of God in our midst and we look forward to a year that will be a blessing to all of us and to the Church at large.

We presently have nine men in the mens' dormitory. There are Ken Brunson and Ivan Burrell from Oklahoma (both former students at S. V.A.); Kenneth Knoll, Mike Weir, and Mark Ling, all juniors, are here from New Auburn, Wisconsin: Jerry Pedersen, another junior, comes to us from Toledo, Ohio. Outstanding Book

LETTERS TO KAREN on Keeping Love in Marriage by Charlie W. Shedd; Abingdon Press; 159 pp.; \$3.00.

"Daddy," said Karen Shedd, following her engagement, "I'd like you to tell me how I can keep him loving me forever." This unusual request led to the writing of the letters which comprise the chapters of this book.

Charlie W. Shedd was better equipped than most fathers to tackle such an assignment. As a minister and counselor for more than 25 years, he was able to draw on his wealth of experience to point out the pitfalls that are hazardous to marriages.

Letters to Karen is written with delightful good humor and delicate intimacy. With equal ease the author deals with housekeeping, money, communication, sex, meeting adversity and setting rules for a good clean fight. The answer to the divorce problem, he says, is to make marriage what it should be. "And what it should be is a sacred triune relationship between the Lord and you and your husband forever and ever."

I recommend this book, without reservation, to every bride-to-be, and every bride of one to fifty years who desires to put her marriage on solid footing.
