

PROPERTY VALUED BY DOLLARS.

Council Proceedings.
MONDAY EVENING, June 29.

Council met pursuant to adjournment.
Members present: E. Sanford, President; Watt, O'Connor, Black and Jackson.

The journal of last meeting was read and approved.

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the Mayor's last monthly report, found it all correct, and so reported.

The Gas Committee asked further time in which to make their report, and it was granted.

Committee on Fire Department asked further time in which to make their report on the matter referred to them at the last meeting.

A petition was received, signed by a number of citizens from the Third Ward, asking the location of one of the steamers in that Ward.

Also, the remonstrance of three hundred citizens of the other Wards against the removal of the engines or either of them from their present location.

An ordinance, ordering an assessment on the south end of West street, to pay the cost of stoning, was introduced and read the first time.

The recommendation of the Board of Improvement to stone Baker alley, from Pierce to McDonald street, was taken up and adopted, and a resolution requiring the improvement to be made was introduced and read for the first time.

The report of the Committee appointed to equalize the assessment on Buckeye alley was received and adopted, and an ordinance authorizing the assessment was introduced and read for the first time.

The Committee appointed at last meeting by the Council, to equalize the assessment on McDonald street, having failed to meet, on motion, Frank Ashton, Jr., was substituted in the place of W. K. Boone, and the Committee was requested to meet at the office of the City Clerk, July 2, at 9 o'clock, A. M., and be sworn.

The assessment, as made by the Board of Improvement, on property joining on Ottawa alley, was taken up and the Clerk was required to have notice of the same published according to law.

The City Engineer's report of grade of Cherry Alley, as surveyed by him, was received and adopted.

An ordinance requiring the railroad companies to light their way through the city with gas, was read the second time.

The memorial of Dennis Tuma, asking the privilege of changing a ditch from the middle of his lot, was referred to the Board of Improvement.

The recommendation of the Board of Improvement to issue an order to Frank Wright for three hundred dollars, for part pay for stoning West street, was allowed by the Council, and the Clerk ordered to issue orders for the same.

The following bills were allowed and ordered to be paid:

George Williams, services as rodman on streets, \$24.75.
George Houtzer, one and a half day's services as rodman, \$2.25.
J. Titus, one day's services as rodman, \$1.50.
I. Reichelderfer, for lumber, \$28.88.
John Lyons, for work on sidewalk, nine days, at \$1.75 per day, \$15.75.
G. G. Rupert, for stone for sewers, 38 perch, at \$1.25 per perch, \$47.50.

The remonstrance of L. S. Pillars and other property holders on West North street, remonstrating against the grading of the same, was received and laid over for one week.

The bids on the letting of the different contracts were opened, and the contracts were awarded to the following persons and prices:

Union street to J. W. O'Connor, at 18 cents per yard, for excavation. Tanner to same party, at 20 cents per yard. William Havil got the contract of Tanner street sewer, at \$2.15 per perch.

P. Mulcahy was awarded the contract of excavation for said sewer at 22 cents per cubic yard. Bartley Smith got the contract for stoning the gutters on Main street, at 20 cents per foot front, on each side of the street. G. G. Rupert got the contract of stoning of Main street, at \$1.25 per cubic yard.

On motion the Council adjourned until Monday, July 6th.
