WHY THIS INDEX WAS WRITTEN

When I came into contact with Ambassador College, what impressed me most was how it disseminated basic, yet vital, knowledge in so many fields of learning. Ambassador College writers made truths long hidden from the eyes of the world come alive. Their writing immediately aroused interest and was easy to comprehend.

At Ambassador College, students are told how Ambassador College is a gold mine of true knowledge, of right standards, and of truth about God and His way of life. Every student is encouraged to get busy and mine this precious gold.

Almost all the knowledge and principles (the gold) taught at the college have, at one time, been thoroughly researched and published in a PT, GN, CC, booklet, etc. Yet there are only a few, small, incomplete indexes generally available to aid one in finding specific topics (the individual gold nuggets) which have been written about in the college's valuable literature. Many people have a huge stack of Ambassador College literature; yet they are unable to effectively use it because they lack a comprehensive index to it—which is just like owning a deed to a gold mine and having no diagram showing where to find the gold.

To help myself locate certain specific topics discussed in the college's literature, I made an index of this literature on about 60 note cards; yet I regretted that many priceless articles revealing the logical, simple, "plain" truth on so many vitally important subjects--written after many hours of prayer, research, and even fasting--were forgotten or the whereabouts of these articles was unknown. People often would remember a specific old article they needed to refer to, but usually they couldn't locate it without spending many frustrating minutes or hours thumbing through old PTs, GNs, or CCs, since they didn't have a comprehensive index available.

A year ago, I took my hand-written card index to the Ambassador College Press, where, in actual use, the index proved to be of value. At the urging of several people, I typed and edited this index so others would be able to use it. My purpose was to make Ambassador College's literature easy to locate for those on campus who could use it to facilitate their jobs and to save people who needed to use this literature priceless hours of time.

I'm extremely indebted to and wish to thank Messrs. Earl Sixt. Richard Sedliacik, Graham Davies, Phil Robison, and Joe Bohannon, as well as Judy Mills and Betty Lau, for the help and counsel they gave me on this index.

HOW TO LOCATE MATERIAL ON A GIVEN SUBJECT

This index is only a SUBJECT index, not a title or author index.

Titles are used only if they happen to match the subject of the material.

Most reprint articles or letters have an identifying 3-digit number, such as 001, 555, 999. The others use letters of the alphabet, e.g., AGR, MR-GAL, GDN.

When you look up a certain subject, you'll find most of the material available on that subject following the name of the subject. Use the cross references if you're unable to locate the material you want under a certain subject heading. Below is how to interpret the different types of sources used:

PT 1/66 p6--Subject appears in Jan. '66 PT starting on page 6.

TW 1/66 p6--Subject appears in Jan. '66 TW starting on page 6.

GN 1/66 p6--Subject appears in Jan. '66 GN starting on page 6.

Old CC8 p6--Subject appears in Lesson 8 of the old CC series starting on page 6.

New CC8 p6--Subject appears in Lesson 8 of the new CC series starting on page 6.

123 (numbers go from 001-999) -- Subject appears in a reprint article or letter designated by the number 123.

AGR -- Subject appears in a reprint letter designated by the letters AGR.

If a reference to a source doesn't include a page number (e.g., 123, or AGR, or Marriage Obsolete--BK, or Old CC2), skim through the source until you find the material you're looking for. Most sources will have a page number (e.g., Old CC8 p6, PT 6/71 p33).
