

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

Editorial

Little Things Mean A Lot

Some of you "older" students may remember a catchy pop record that had this title. Kitty Kallen popularized it some years ago.

It illustrates a very *important principle*—one we sometimes TAKE FOR GRANTED at Ambassador College. To us the *little things* can sometimes be a problem. The excuse cliche usually goes like this: "I'm too busy to attend to the 'little things.'" Or we say, "But that's 'physical.'" Or the saying goes, "Oh well, it isn't that important anyhow."

But the Bible tells us the EXACT OPPOSITE.

"The man who is faithful in the little things will be faithful IN THE BIG THINGS... and if you are not trustworthy with someone else's property, who will give you property of your own" (Luke 16:10, Phillips).

Walt Sharp must have been real glad he knew AND FOLLOWED this principle the morning he was eating breakfast in a potential member's home. It was during a baptizing tour. This particular family happened to be QUITE WEALTHY—in a very high income bracket!

Breakfast went like this:

The man of the house deluged his slice of bread with butter and honey. He reached for the unweildy and dripping—butter and honey stratified bread—and precariously perched it on his lower set of molars. Then he began chomping on the entire slice—chop by chop!

Walter carefully took a pat of butter and placed it on his plate. He studiously rolled some honey over the butter. With great deliberation he mixed the two elements. Then he judiciously broke the bread in two. He placed some of the mixture on the bread. With utmost propriety he began to eat.

The prospective member eyed him carefully. Suddenly he called out to the kitchen. "Say, honey would you come and see this!"

His wife entered the dining room.

"Look at that—look how he is eating his bread . . . they do TRAIN THOSE MEN RIGHT out at that Ambassador!!"

That was a "little thing"—but it paid BIG dividends.

When the children came home from the Summer Educational Program—what was it that the parents noticed? It was the "little things." The children made their beds—for the first time in their life. They put their clothes away. They did their own exercises.

All these are the "little things."

But we're all quite little ourselves. We're all quite physical ourselves. Being spiritual is only using the physical things rightly! The big job comes off because someone paid attention to the "little things."

A sloppy bed is a "little thing"—but it can mess up a BIG ROOM.

An oil spot on the rug is a "little thing"—but it sure makes a BIG RUG look dirty.

A misdirected or lost letter is a "little thing"—probably weighs less than an ounce—but it can foul up a BIG JOB.

A wrong address is just a "little mistake"—but it can have BIG CONSEQUENCES.

Don't kid yourself! Don't let anyone else kid you. The little things ARE important. If you're sloppy in the "little jobs"—don't expect to land a big position. But if you're meticulous in the "little details," the seemingly tiny character defects, the small jobs—you'll find the BIG problems disappear. Because the little problems in our life are usually an expression of the BIG problems that enslave us.

"The Gym Story"


Smile, you're on Candid Camera! Well, not really unless you have been down on Terrace Street observing the demolition and construction work.




The Freshmen five will flail into fourth place. As can be expected of any green, rookie team, they will have problems adjusting to the rapid pace of NTA play.

However the standings shape up or shake up—will be interesting, but look to this NBA circuit to give you thrills all season long as six wellbalanced teams take the court!













New Flag Pole For Ambassador

DEVELOPMENT OF FRENCH WORK NOTED AS NEW BROADCAST BEGINS

The French Work has made another giant stride forward! With the addition in February of a Saturday morning broadcast, *Le Monde a Venir* will beam more than one million watts per week over Radio Europe Number One, Europe's most modern radio station.

Already on this station Wednesday and Sunday mornings plus Monday mornings over Radio Luxembourg, this addition will boost the total to four fifteen-minute broadcasts per week. Radio Europe Number One, 400,000 watts strong, was built after World War II and is heard in all the French speaking countries — France, Switzerland, Belgium, and even North Africa at times.

The added time means that Mr. Dibar Apartian, director of the French Work, will be preparing scripts and taping three broadcasts each week, instead of the two he is now doing. With these increased responsibilities, he plans to teach less and devote more time to the French Work.

Meanwhile, the Geneva, Switzerland office is open for business! The office has been completely remodeled, the new furniture is all in place, and the sign is on the door. The French edition of the Plain Truth— La Pure Verite—is now being mailed from there by Mr. Colin Wilkins, from Ambassador College, U.K., and Mr. Bourdin, a French member baptized in Paris a year ago.

Grove Manor Repainted

The sand-blasters have struck again! The old coat of paint on the Grove Manor apartments has been stripped off in preparation for a brand new shade of off-white. This will match the accompanying 380 and 390 apartments.

Work began on this project two weeks ago. Now the final steps are being completed. After the initial sand - blasting, the buildings were scrubbed down with a high-pressure hose and brush. Then the window mouldings were scraped, cleaned and taped for painting.

The final result will be a beigecolored apartment with a deep green trim which matches the adjoining, newly acquired properties.

After being discussed for years, the bakery began experimentally last summer under the direction of Miss Norma Jean Cokomatch. Her research quickly established that we could save nearly 50 per cent over the prices we had been paying!

Mr. Ackerman begins work at 4 a.m., five days a week, to insure ever-fresh baked products. Many favorable comments have already resulted from the breads of his early morning labors.

IBM Efficiency Modernizes Supply Dept.

Beginning the middle of January, 1964, Ambassador College will have the FIRST college direct telephone ordering system in California, perhaps in the whole United States.

This is how it works:

We will have a deck of several hundred IBM cards. Each card designates a particular office supply item. These cards are run through a 1001 IBM transmitter which is connected to a standard telephone line. The machine at the opposite end, in Los Angeles, types information from the cards. The card is transmitted a second time to the IBM accounting department insuring them a record of the transaction.

This system of ordering supplies guarantees 24-hour service, and prolongs the expansion of the stock room since items will not be stored in quantity.

Student Union Has New T. V.

Ambassador College now has its own television set! For those who haven't noticed, it is located on the mantle behind the counter in the Student Center. This beautiful new Silvertone set is a rich dark brownish color to blend in with the woodwork. It has a HUGE 23-inch screen, specially ground to diminish glare.

ZINJANTHROPUS?

Probing in the depths of the Sengeti Plains in Tanganyika, famed archeologists Louis S. B. Leakey and his wife Mary suddenly "stumbled" across the "EARLIEST MAN ON EARTH"!

Zinjanthropus (Zinj for short) was discovered on July 17, 1959, all "broken-up"—in 400 fragments as a matter of fact. Spotting the temporal section of a skull and two preposterously large teeth, Mrs. Leakey's archaeological instinct immediately advised her that these bones belonged to a human skelton. Ecstatic, excited, and exuberant, she kept shouting: "Our Man! It's our Man! I've got him. Hurry! Hurry!"

Tedious toil unearthed the 400 fragments from the time-worn strata. Patient piecing together of this archaeological jigsaw produced a "male skull," complete except for the lower jaw. Soil samples of the volcanic minerals surrounding "Zinj" when subjected to the potassium-argon dating process revealed "Our Man" to be no less than 1,750,000 years old.

Easily overlooked were the irregularities that "Zinji's" forehead sloped abruptly back (unlike any human's today), allowing for less than one-half the brain capacity present-day man has. The palate was "almost as arched as ours." His thirty-two teeth were just a little irregular - the molars were the largest ever found in a human skull (twice the width of ours), while the canines and incisors were small. Also, the lower jaw (which was never found) was abnormally massive. But that's all right, because the hair covering Zinji's face and head wasn't found either, yet both appear in the "artist's conception" of Zini.

Have you seen Zinjanthropus? If not, check the January, 1963, issue of Reader's Digest where the full story of the "find" is described. It also shows pictures of Dr. Leakey and Zinj (that's Dr. Leakey's picture on the first page).

campus stream. Both fountains are the artistry of the same sculptor. The new fountain is a "wee-bit" larger—in fact, it's nine feet high, eight feed wide, and weighs nearly a ton.

Three color-lighted jets will spew streams of water to heights of fifteen, twelve and ten feet. The jetted water will then tumble over two water cascades, splash over the palm-shaped arms and legs protruding from the fountain, completing its cycle.
